All of the following activities are suggestions only, choose the activities you feel would benefit you and your child, and don't feel under pressure to complete any or every activity.

Please continue to read as much as possible with your child, and encourage them to read any words they will know. Practise your child's sight words with them, and if possible, add the following sight words this week:

some come	said	here	
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When practising sight words with your child, tell them that they can not sound out these words, and then focus on what the words look like. Write each word out twice and then cut them up and get your child to match them. You could play memory games with them, take one away and ask your child which one is missing etc – keep the learning game based and your child will find it easier to learn. When your child can identify the new words, it is important to then start reading them in sentences, using a mix of sight words and words your child can blend.

Examples of sentences using new sight words – they don't have to be in a story, and you can ask your child to supply the sentences too.

Hi, said Pat.	
Here is a hat.	
Can I have a drink.	
I want some lunch.


